## 8 COUNTIES ACCOUNT FOR >50% OF VOTE TOTAL



Milwaukee, Dane, Waukesha, Brown, Racine, Outagamie, Winnebago & Washington

- **130,232 more votes** produced in these counties in 2018 than 2014
- Evers received 156,223 more votes than Gov. Walker in top 50% vote producing counties (*In 2014 Walker only trailed by 25,826 in those same counties*)
- Milwaukee & Dane produced 69,732 more votes in 2018 than 2014.
- Evers beat Walker by 88,256 more
  votes in Milwaukee & Dane than Burke
  did

• Walker received 5,806 votes less in these counties than 2014

- **196,783 more votes** produced in these counties in 2018 than 2014
- Evers received 99,968 more votes than Gov. Walker in top 75% vote producing counties (*In 2014 Walker was leading by* 67,626 votes in the top 75%)
- Evers received 175,562 more votes than Burke in these counties
- Walker received 5,336 votes more in these counties than 2014
